Featuring returning guest conductor and violin soloist NZ School of Music Strings Head Martin Riseley:



The Manawatu Sinfonia completes is highly successful jubilee year this Sunday afternoon with a stunning concert featuring leading New Zealand violinist Martin Riseley. Riseley is well known for his concert tours in New Zealand and overseas. He is now well known in Palmerston North, haven given a recital earlier in the year for Chamber Music New Zealand and for conducting the Sinfonia and playing violin solo last year with a memorable performance of the Beethoven violin concerto. Wellington and has coached the orchestra to play at its very best. Audience members at his Sinfonia concert last year said it was a new orchestra that had come to town. This year he has taken the orchestra to new heights as he shaped the programme that also includes Schubert's 3rd symphony.

"The Schubert is a lovely piece which suits the ensemble and it is a nice way to develop the ensemble," says Riseley. But for Riseley, the big attraction is the Mozart violin concerto. "I've performed all of the Mozart concerti several times — except this one, which is a lovely piece, so I'm keen to play it more!" he explains. All the Mozart concerts are fabulous, both to play and to listen to he says, "why didn't he write more!"

Riseley also enjoys both conducting and playing the solos. "It's a natural extension of how I want to express myself as a musician and show others ways in which music, as a language, can work and communicate something to an audience."

He admits switching back and forth between the two roles is always a challenge, "mostly for the playing part, so you have to be really on top of that." And as he has shown in rehearsal already, he is! As Sinfonia concertmaster Allan Rae says, "this is a concert not to be missed!"
