Bruch Violin Concerto with Hannah Fang



We are excited to welcome back Peter van Drimmelen to conduct our next concert which features Hannah Fang performing the Bruch Violin Concerto. Peter has conducted the Manawatu Sinfonia on a near-annual basis since 2003. He retired from the NZSO in May 2014 but has numerous continuing musical activities and has authored a book of memoirs entitled 'Driving for Music'.

Heng (Hannah) Fang began her musical journey when she was three years old, studying violin first with her father and uncle and from age ten under renowned violin professor Zhang Shixiang (Peter Zhang) at the Shang Hai Conservatory of Music. She placed

first in her Bachelor's degree with the Orchestral Department in 2002 and took her Master's degree in the Performing and Teaching Department at Xing

Hai Conservatory of Music with a full scholarship in 2008. Hannah moved to Palmerston North in 2015, where she obtained her Music Teachers' Registration in New Zealand (IRMTNZ). Please join us for a wonderful afternoon of music this Sunday (12th August), 2.30pm at the Speirs Centre.

Shirley Chesswas

The many of us who knew and played music with Shirley were saddened to hear of her recent passing. Shirley joined the society in 1963 when she played in the newly-formed Youth Orchestra for three years. Then followed a long association with the Sinfonia, playing for various periods from 1968 whilst working around farming and bringing up a family. This continued until around 2014 when her developing health issues made further playing difficult. Shirley was, for a long time, leader of the second violin section, where she gained the respect and support of her fellow section members. For much of that time her husband, Jim, was Sinfonia Leader - the husband and wife team was an opportunity most orchestras do not get. They would practice their respective parts together and coordinate the bowing. Their commitment to the society was also evidenced by the two hours travel they would undertake twice a week from Wanganui.

Shirley's valued contribution to the Society over a period of almost 50 years was recognised in 2015, when the Society's Jubilee Cup was awarded jointly to her and Jim. Sinfonia would not have been the same over all those years without Shirley. Always smiling and pleasant, she was a reliable and conscientious player and section leader, and always supportive of her colleagues.

Our thoughts are with Jim and their family as they cope with their sad loss.

Renaissance Singers Concert with Manawatu Sinfonia

At the Regent on Broadway on Saturday November 10, 2018 at 7.30pm - an historic world premiere performance of The Hymn of Adam and Eve by 18th century English composer Samuel Arnold, coupled with Part Three of Haydn's Creation, conducted by Guy Donaldson

The concert features the Palmerston North Renaissance Singers, the Whanganui Schola Sacra (director Roy Tankersley of Palmerston North), the Manawatu Sinfonia, soloists from Palmerston North, and New Zealand coloratura soprano Pasquale Orchard.

Samuel Arnold was a leading English composer and musicologist (he was the original editor of Handel's oratorios, and he also conducted the first English performance of Haydn's oratorio Creation). He subsequently composed the Hymn of Adam and Eve following the first performance of Creation as a showcase for a brilliant German soprano that he had been working with.

Unfortunately just before the first performance of his oratorio, Arnold died and was buried in Westminster Abbey. The work has subsequently never been performed anywhere in the world, as Arnold's importance in England was overshadowed by Haydn.

Palmerston North musicologist Professor Robert Hoskins is a world authority on Samuel Arnold, and he has prepared the performing edition that will be used. Part Three of Haydn's Creation deals with Adam and Eve and is therefore an ideal partner to this work.
