MOZART, Piano Concerto in D minor





On Sunday (15th May) the Sinfonia will be performing with Angela Cook. Angela Cook grew up in England and began learning the piano at the age of four, receiving her ALCM before she left high school. She then continued her piano studies at Manchester University under the guidance of Peter Donohoe and later Kath Parry Jones. When she moved to Palmerston North in 1993 Angela became a member of the Registered Institute of Music Teachers and established the Sunday Afternoon Concert Series at Te Manawa (now in its 23rd year), where she played regularly as soloist and accompanist and with many chamber music groups. She has a busy teaching studio in the city and also teaches students in Masterton and the Wairarapa where she lives with her husband David on a newly acquired organic farm near Carterton. Angela commutes from Masterton to Palmerston North every week in order to continue to teach piano at her studio in Longburn and very much enjoys her dual life.

Mozart entered the D Minor concerto into his catalogue on 10 February 1785 and the very next day was soloist at the first performance, without having had time to play through the final Rondo movement in advance. Given the stormy character of both the first and final movements, the young Beethoven naturally excelled as one of this concerto's early performers and wrote for it a pair of powerfully expressive cadenzas that will be performed at this concert. (Mozart's own cadenzas have not survived.) We hope to see many of you at the Speirs Centre on Sunday 15th May at 2.30pm.

This brings someone's ability to achieve perfection. I was fortunate enough to be a part of the Saturday Music Training Orchestra and Manawatu Youth Orchestra for nearly 8 years. The orchestra leader was a position I always admired and was something I had my eye on achieving. Being able to lead a group of individuals who have similar passions and love for making music had always been a personal goal and am very fortunate to be given the chance this year for MYO.



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I now learn violin with Hannah Fang and piano with Liz Locke. Being in the orchestra has been a truly enjoyable and memorable experience for me enhancing my playing and confidence in performing. I am truly grateful to all the conductors and teachers through my growing up for their guidance and teaching me to play and appreciate the music and will always have a place in my heart. To all the people I have been able to play amongst; it has been a very fond and memorable experience which I will always treasure.
